DR. HILL INSISTS ON RESIGNING.

HE WILL END HIS WORK WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF ROCHESTER.

Rochester, N. Y., March 10 (Special).—Dr. David Jayne Hill, president of Rochester University, stands by his letter of resignation tendered to the Board of Trustees in November, and so informed L. P. Ross, chairman of the committee representing the Board, last night. Originally, it was the intention of Dr. Hill to leave the University on New Year's, but he yielded to solicitation to hold the matter in abeyance in order to give the Citizens' Committee appointed by the Chamber of Commerce time to raise an endowment fund of \$100,000. Dr. Hill has been hampered by a lack of funds, and it was thought that money to work with would bring about a change in his plans. Efforts to raise the money have not met with encouragement, probably only one-third of the necessary amount having been secured. At the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce committee this afternoon further efforts were abandoned.

Dr. Hill declines to enter into discussion of his plans for the future. He will leave the institution at commencement. He says that the faculty is so well organized that the interval necessary between his withdrawal and the appointment of his successor need not lead to embarrassing results. He hopes, however, that the endowment will be secured, as it will put new life into the college.
